## Can Group Therapy Unlock the Full Potential of Psychedelic Treatments?

This paper advocates for integrating social cure research into psychedelic practices to enhance therapeutic effectiveness and suggests a framework for scientific research in this area.



#### Group Therapy

- Psychedelic treatments are mostly one-on-one.
   Legal, social, and research barriers limit group therapy adoption, with clinicians concerned about legal risks and reputation damage.
- The social cure model shows that group therapy enhances mental health by fostering social identity, offering psychological support, and providing greater agency and meaning for participants.
- In group therapy, personal identity may dissolve, but the emergence of a strong group identity brings transformative benefits that outweigh this limitation.

Groups provide support, control, self-esteem, & meaning-enhancing resilience

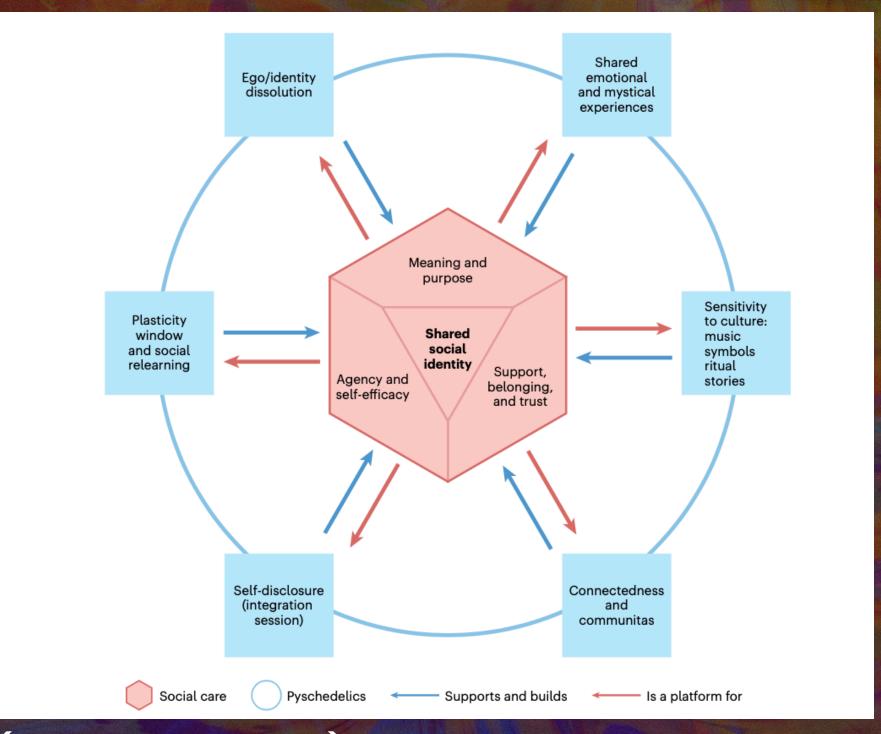
